# Attending to Scripture

#### Reading

A reading from the Bible or, occasionally, from another source may follow, concluding with an invitation and challenge:

Let us listen for the Word of the Lord.

Silence for reflection.

The Gospel

The Gospel is announced:

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to ..... **Glory to you, O Lord.** 

At the end:

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.** 

Homily or Silent Reflection

A brief talk and/or a period of silence may be offered.

Prayers of God's People

Jesus taught his disciples how to pray. In his name and through God's Spirit, we offer our prayers to the Father.

Prayers of intercession follow, conduding with the Lord's Prayer.

One of these biddings and responses may be used.

Your kingdom come. Your will be done. God of our yearning. We seek you.



OUR FATHER in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

The Story


The Communion Table is prepared.

What we do here, we do in imitation of what Christ first did.

To his followers in every age, Jesus gave an example and command rooted in the experience he shared with his disciples in an upstairs room in Jerusalem. So now we do as Jesus did.

We take this bread and this wine, produce of the earth and fruit of human labour.

In these, Jesus has promised to be present; through these, Christ can make us whole.



Great Prayer of Thanksgiving

May God be with you. **And also with you.** 

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to God.

Let us give thanks to our gracious God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, for you made us, and before us, you made the world we inhabit, and before the world, you made the eternal home in which, through Christ, we have a place.

All that is spectacular, all that is plain have their origin in you; all that is lovely, all who are loving point to you as their fulfilment.

And grateful as we are for the world we know and the universe beyond our understanding, we particularly praise you, whom eternity cannot contain, for coming to earth and entering time in Jesus.



For his life which informs our living, for his compassion which changes our hearts, for his clear speaking which contradicts our harmless generalities, for his disturbing presence, his innocent suffering, his fearless dying, his rising to life-breathing forgiveness, we praise and worship you.

Here too our gratitude rises for the promise of the Holy Spirit, who even yet, even now, confronts us with your claims and attracts us to your goodness. Therefore we gladly join our voices to the song of the Church on earth and in heaven, saying:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of truth and love. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest!

Blessèd is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

And now, lest we believe that our praise alone fulfils your purpose, we fall silent and remember him who came because words were not enough.

Setting our wisdom, our will, our words aside, emptying our hearts, and bringing nothing in our hands, we yearn for the healing, the holding, the accepting, the forgiving which Christ alone can offer.

### MERCIFUL GOD,

send now, in kindness, your Holy Spirit to settle on this bread and wine and fill them with the fullness of Jesus.

And let that same Spirit rest on us, converting us from the patterns of this passing world, until we conform to the shape of him whose food we now share. Amen.

### Breaking of the Bread

The minister takes the bread and breaks it.

Among friends, gathered round a table, Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and said, 'This is my body - broken for you.'


The minister takes the cup of wine.

Later he took a cup of wine, gave thanks and said, 'This is the new relationship with God made possible because of my death. Take it, all of you, to remember me.'

#### Invitation

This is the table not of the Church, but of the Lord. It has been made ready for those who love him and who want to love him more. So come, you who have much faith and you who have little; you who have tried to follow and you who have failed. Come, not because I invite you: it is our Lord; and it is his will that those who seek him should meet him here.

Everyone is invited to share in the Holy Communion by receiving either the bread and wine, or a blessing.



### The Communion

The following words of administration may be used:

The bread of heaven.

The cup of life.

At the conclusion, a period of silence is shared.

#### Prayer of Dedication

Let us pray.

In gratitude, in deep gratitude for this moment, this meal, these people, we give ourselves to you.



Take us out to live as changed people because we have shared the Living Bread and cannot remain the same.

Enable us to become the people you are calling us to be that we may live to your glory, both as inhabitants of earth and citizens of the commonwealth of heaven. Amen.

### Gift of Peace

This or another invitation is used.

Christ who has nourished us, is our peace. Strangers and friends, male and female, old and young, he has broken down the barriers to bind us to him and to each other.

Having tasted his goodness, let us share his peace.

The peace of the Lord be always with you. **And also with you.** 



#### Blessing

This or another form is used.

God be your comfort and your strength; God be your hope and your support; God be your light and your way; and the blessing of God, Creator, Christ and Spirit of Life, be among you, and all whom you love, both living and departed, now and always. **Amen.** 


### **Closing Responses**
