FAITH SHIFT

13 OCTOBER 7PM

Going through a shift in faith can be disorientating and painful.

Re-examining or deconstructing a treasured belief system can leave you feeling isolated. With the help of three guests,

Joy Adams, Jim Bawden and Beth Keith,

we explore faith deconstruction, with wisdom from the journey and plenty of time for questions and responses.

Jim describes himself as an ex-charismatic-evangelical,
ex-church leader turned psychotherapist,
who is still captivated by the person and teachings of Jesus,
whilst healing from experiences within the Christian religion.
Professionally, he works with a number of people at various
points of faith-shift/questioning/deconstruction and is fascinated
by the cross-over between psychotherapy and spirituality.

Joy used to describe herself as a radical evangelical with charismatic tendencies 20 years ago. Since then, those formative spiritualities have been transformed by a deepening contemplative spirituality centred on the person of Jesus and influenced by Ignatian spirituality. She is a spiritual accompanier and finds it a huge privilege to accompany those who are discovering there is more to the Divine Mystery than they had ever thought.

Beth is St Mark's Liberal Theologian, her theology has moved some distance from the faith of her childhood. Her faith shift was influenced by a mix of academic study, her work as a sexual health practitioner supporting young people at risk of exploitation, and in supporting victims of spiritual abuse.



SHEFFIELD CHURCH ACTION ON POVERTY'S 15TH PILGRIMAGE IS VISITING ST

MARK'S CURCH -This year's Urban Poverty Pilgrimage is a linear walk taking place on Saturday 19 October. The route goes through St Mark's Parish and Mission Area. We shall explore community issues and church social action with a number of churches. We assemble between 9 and 930 at St Andrew's United Reformed Church, Broomhall, Upper Hanover Street, where we shall hold our opening service and learn about projects in Broomhall. Then we shall



walk, via Ben's Centre, to St Mark's Church, for a discussion with some people from the church over tea and coffee. Then we shall walk to St Mary's, Walkley, for a similar discussion, while we eat our packed lunches. Our last visit is to Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church, Hillsborough, with discussion and final prayers ending around 230 pm/3pm. From there, it is an easy tram or bus ride back to Broomhall or to the City Centre. The total walk is around 2.8 miles. It is urban but picturesque with some uphill and some quite steep downhill stretches. All are welcome on the pilgrimage. Thinking Faith at St Mark's – save the date

'THE CRY FOR HOPE' OF THE PALESTINIAN CHRISTIANS



A study session at St Mark's Church Broomfield Road, Sheffield, S10 2SE 7 pm to 8.30 pm on Sunday 10 November

In July 2020 Kairos Palestine, 'the most extensive Palestinian Christian ecumenical non-violent movement' in partnerships with Global Kairos for Justice, 'a worldwide coalition of concerned Christians from different churches', issued a 'call for decisive action' to Christians throughout the world. Here are some passages from the Cry for Hope:

- 'We have arrived at a critical point in the struggle to end the oppression of the Palestinian people...The State of 'Israel's adoption of the Nation State Law in 2018 legalized institutional discrimination in Israel and the Palestinian territories'.
- 'We call upon all Christians and on churches at congregational, denominational, national, and global ecumenical levels to engage in a process of study, reflection and confession concerning the historic and systemic deprivation of the rights of the Palestinian people.

 Both organisations support 'ending the Israeli colonization of Palestine and advocating for the right of self-determination of Palestinian people and peace with justice for all people in the holy land'

In February, General Synod will be asked whether the Church of England should sign up to this document. At our meeting, Jenny Bywater will tell us of her experiences as an Ecumenical Accompanier in the West Bank, Mark James will speak about the Cry for Hope and David Price will offer a critique of the document. There will then be discussion.

All are welcome. Please join us.








WHAT'S ON IN THE MISSION AREA:

OCTOBER ECO TIP

This year, we will be supporting the Eco Tip calendar provided by Rocha, who gave us our Gold Eco Church Award last year, follow along for a new tip every month:

Contribute to wildlife conservation. Clean bird feeders to prevent diseases spreading to winter migrants. Install a nest box well before breeding season to provide a cosy retreat for small birds during cold winter nights. As you observe the local birds reflect on this verse, 'I know every bird in the mountains, and the insects in the fields are mine.' Psalm 50:11
