## **ST MARKS NEWS:**

**SAFEGUARDING** - Churches across the country are encouraged to mark Safeguarding Sunday on or around 17 November. It's an important initiative which we are focusing on this week to bring our current Stewardship sermon series to a close. We know that within our congregation there are people who have come to St Mark's seeking a safe space following traumatic experiences in their lives and we recognise that for some people, publication of The Makin Review (which you can find a link to here) which identified failures within the Church regarding safeguarding responsibilities and publicity surrounding Archbishop Justin Welby's decision to resign may trigger further confusion, doubt and mistrust in the Church of England. Bishop Pete and Sophie have issued a statement in response to the resignation of the Archbishop, that you can read here. Beth and I would like to reassure you that we and the Safeguarding team at St Mark's are working hard to embody best practice, to support those who have suffered abuse of any kind and to review where improvements can be made to ensure failings of the past are not repeated.

**Safe Spaces** is a free and independent service supporting survivors of church-related abuse delivered by the service providers, First Light.

**STEWARDSHIP PLEDGE FORMS** - Thank you to everyone who filled in the questionnaire about what you value about St Mark's. The Stewardship Group were really pleased to have received over 40 responses and very encouraged by what you wrote. There is still time to fill it in (here) if you haven't got round to doing it yet, and we really appreciate hearing from long-time regulars, those who are newer to St Mark's, and those who worship with us more occasionally. The PCC will be looking carefully at the results of the questionnaire in the New Year as we begin to make future plans.

As you now know, the financial situation is more urgent and we are getting in touch now to ask your plans for giving to St Mark's over the coming year. Many thanks to those of you who are ahead of us, and in response to the questionnaire, have started giving or increased your giving already. It does really help us to plan if we have a better idea of what to expect in the coming year. The Church of England guidance on giving is to consider giving away 10% of income after tax, with 5% going to the Church and 5% to other charities. We understand that we all have different financial pressures and even small amounts given regularly (e.g. by standing order/direct debit) makes a big difference to our church community. Of course we would not want anyone to feel pressured, but we would ask that you think carefully and pray about this.

**ADMINISTRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION** – From the start of Advent, I December, we will no longer be offering intinction at the 10am service and will move to the single option of gluten, soya, dairy and egg free bread and the common cup. Receiving bread or wine only is considered full Communion and there is no pressure for anyone to drink from the Common Cup. Every adult will be offered the chalice and given the chance to hold it for a moment and then return it to the chalice bearer without consuming any wine. We have heard from other churches that this has been well received and offers a meaningful connection to the cup for those who would rather not drink from it. At the 8am BCP service, we will continue to use wafers and will offer intinction and the Common Cup. Shan and Beth

#### Meet Ian Wallace

Many of you know lan as he was the Vicar of St Mark's before Sue Hammersley and we're really pleased that he's helping us with Thinking Faith and some other theological things in the New Year. He has nearly thirtyfive years of ordained ministry under his belt. He taught New Testament and early Christian origins at Cambridge and Durham Universities, as well as on various ministry training programmes, including the Yorkshire Ministry Course (currently, St Hild) where he served as Principal. Drawing on academic research and personal experience, lan has spent much of his adult life helping church communities relate contemporary Christian practice to the original impulse of faith embodied in Jesus. Although retired, lan is currently supporting the parish of Worsbrough during an extended vacancy.

Ian will be one of the panel speakers at Thinking Faith on 8 December at 7pm.

#### Meet Canon Jane Brooke

When I retired, I moved to Sheffield in January 2024 from Chester with my husband George to be near to our daughter and her family. I have been an SSM (self-supporting minister) deacon, then priest most of my adult life, apart from the last 5 years when I was employed as Canon Missioner and Vice Dean at Chester Cathedral where I introduced, in partnership with the diocese, an online and recorded series of theological and Bible studies.

I taught RE for over 20 years in various posts with ages from 3 to 18. I worked for REtoday services delivering courses to teachers on RE. Then worked in Cheshire Local Authority as RE Adviser and Principal Secondary Schools Improvement Adviser. My passion has always been how to teach RE using the creative arts. Alongside this I trained as an Ofsted inspector (RE, Maths, PSHCE) and as a Church School Inspector (Section 48). But found I preferred helping headteachers and teachers to develop rather than making a judgement and then walking away, so I have tended to focus on mentoring rather than inspecting! I was chair of NASACRE (National Association of SACREs) and the English representative on EFTRE (European Forum for Teachers of Religious Education) and worked as RE Project development Officer for the National Society. One of the highlights of my career was introducing the National RE Quality Mark into schools. I have written teaching materials, RE Syllabi and *The RE Teacher's Survival Guide*. I was awarded an honorary doctorate for education from the University of Chester in March 2024.

After five years as a deacon, I was amongst the first women to be priested in 1994, and became associate priest at St George's, Poynton, then became priest-in-charge of St Paul's, Compstall, whilst working as Principal Secondary Schools Adviser in Cheshire Local Authority. In 2010 I became SSM Residentiary Canon Chancellor at Chester Cathedral with a responsibility for Education. Then moved into paid roles as Vice Dean in 2016, Acting Dean in 2017 and then Canon Missioner and Vice Dean where my portfolio included 'Exhibitions, Events, Education and Outreach'. I am always keen that sacred places offer high quality exhibitions and relate them explicitly, through a comment or a question, to the Christian faith. I am now an Honorary Canon Emeritus at Chester with Permission to Officiate in the Diocese of Sheffield.

Whilst at Chester, I wrote a Grove booklet on *Holy communion in Primary Schools* as well as five self-published children's books about a mouse in Chester Cathedral called 'Awesome Anselm'. Since coming to Sheffield, I have written a story for Sheffield Cathedral called 'Talbot the dog meets Sav the storyteller' and a booklet for the Benedictine Lay Community to help children understand the Rule of St Benedict.

George and I have three children and nine grandchildren: a son in Sydney Australia, a son in Somerset and a daughter in Sheffield. George is the Rylands Professor Emeritus of Biblical Criticism and Exegesis at Manchester University and his career has centred around the Dead Sea Scrolls. In our spare time, we very much enjoy going to the theatre or art galleries or being outdoors with our dog, Bumble.

I join the St Mark's clergy on most days for daily morning prayer and for Sunday night services. I am especially pleased to chair the sessions on the evenings of the second Sunday of the month called Thinking Faith.



### WRITING TO MPS ABOUT THE CAN BILL -

No, we do not want you to throw tomato soup at a Van Gogh picture, nor do we want you to sit in the middle of a motorway holding up a placard (and the traffic!) All we want you to do is entirely legal, not difficult but could make a big difference.

The Climate and Nature bill is really important. <u>Click here to discover more</u>. It is due to receive its vital second reading on Friday, 24 January when it has to be supported by at least 102 MPs.

Here is the problem. Many MPs go back to their constituencies on Fridays. Getting 102 MPs to support it may be a problem.

- So please write to your own MP asking them to support the bill on Friday, 24 January.
- But we want you to do more than that. Please write to family and friends who are in other constituencies asking them to write to their MPs.

This year, we will be supporting the Eco Tip calendar provided by <u>Rocha</u>, who gave us our Gold Eco Church Award last year, follow along for a new tip every month:

Green your home. Combat climate change and reduce heating costs by identifying and sealing drafts around your home. Find the gaps that let the cold air in and warm air out (think keyholes, letterboxes, cracks around the edges or bottoms of windows and doors, loft hatches, floorboards, etc.) and fix these gaps using the correct materials and online tutorials. Additionally, place foil or radiator panels to reflect heat into your room. Pray for those who might be experiencing the cold this winter
