NEWS AT ST MARK'S:

SUNDAY 2 FBERUARY – We welcome Rev'd Anesia Cook, Racial Justice Officer in the Diocese of Sheffield to our 10am service to preside and preach for us. Anesia's role is to promote racial diversity, equality, and inclusion whilst tackling racism in all forms. Racial Justice Sunday is usually marked on the second Sunday in February but we are fortunate to have Anesia to help us to reflect on this important issue this week. Anesia also has a strong connection with USPG, a charity St Mark's supports through International Committee donations. USPG accompanies churches in the Anglican Communion in their struggles against injustices associated with gender, economic injustice, climate change, migration, race and the human rights of indigenous people. Anesia will talk about their work over coffee in the lounge at 11.45. There is also a coffee concert in church today following the service.

THE UNCONTROLLING LOVE OF GOD - Join us at Highgate House Conference Centre,

Northamptonshire, to discuss ideas that will change the way you think about the divine. Based around a series of set piece dialogues, this conference will open up avenues of theological thought that challenge the mainstream consensus that 'God' is all powerful and fundamentally 'in control'. Drawing on work from scholars and

practitioners from various parts of the Christian tradition, we will question these certainties and explore other ways of understanding the nature of God. <u>More here</u>

THE ENVIRONMENT:

CLIMATE AND NATURE BILL- This was debated in the Commons on Friday the 24th. Unfortunately it was not passed because the government refused to allow Labour MPs a free vote. It was pushed back to 11 July which means realistically that is dead in the water. That is the bad news. The good news is that there have been positive and encouraging responses from Ed Miliband, the relevant Secretary of State, and Mary Creagh, Minister for Nature. At the end of yesterday's debate, the Minister for Nature, Mary Creagh, promised MPs that next steps will include "binding commitments" to advance the CAN Bill's objectives. Ed Miliband, said via a video (after the debate), he has promised to "set to work" on the CAN Bill's objectives—"including for legislation"—so that we can "make a meaningful difference for climate and nature". This means lots more letter writing to our MPs to keep the pressure up. Please get one off as soon as possible to make known your disappointment and to let them know that pressure to do what is needed will be relentless. Michael Bayley
