

NEWS AT ST MARK'S:



ASSISTED DYING LEGISLATION CURRENTLY GOING THROUGH

PARLIAMENT- You will be aware of the current debate on assisted dying and the legislation going through parliament. Many of you have expressed concerns about this, and also hold differing views on this. There is certainly not a 'correct Christian' view on it. **On Sunday 9th March at 7pm we are holding a panel discussion** with Revd Dr Mark Newitt (chaplain) and Dr Rachel Vedder (palliative care consultant) to explore this. More information below.

Jonathan Williamson (Reader) has asked us to share this with you: Many of us will be following the progress of the Assisted Dying legislation that is currently proceeding through various stages in the House of Commons. It is quite difficult to see what exactly is going on as the mainstream media (BBC, ITV, C4) have been limited in the attention which they have given to the level of scrutiny since the Second Reading. I do not presume to speak for St Mark's Church on this matter, nor would I on any matter, but I have extreme reservations about the way that this bill is progressing. I wrote to my MP (Sheffield Hallam) asking that she vote against the bill on 2nd reading. My reasons are mainly rooted in the belief that life is a sacred gift from God, and that we should not take the decision to end our lives prematurely, let alone assist in the premature death of another. But there are other concerns too – the lack of consideration of palliative care in our society being a major concern. My MP voted for the bill, with a hope that the scrutiny process would iron out any concerns that people may have. Sadly, as I have seen, the scrutiny process has been anything but rigorous, with the committee, and the witnesses selected to give evidence, heavily weighted towards being for Assisted Dying.

I shall be writing to my MP again accordingly, as the scrutiny process has not been good enough, asking that she change her mind on 3rd reading. May I ask, if you feel similarly concerned, that you contact your representatives with any concerns you may have?

DEMENTIA STARS TRAINING - Are you caring for a loved one with Dementia, involved with pastoral care or on the welcome teams at church? If so, you could benefit from attending this training which helps people to understand behaviours and reactions and discover what you might do to help and support a person with dementia better.

This is an excellent short (generally online) training course run by AgeUK Sheffield and Enrichment for the Elderly. It consists of 3x2 hour sessions which are **free to attend** and on completing each level the participants receive successively bronze, silver and gold star badges and certificates. There is no examination. Grace Stead who presents the course is an excellent communicator and has considerable experience herself of caring for somebody with dementia so this is not a highly academic course! Alison Wragg and Claire Webber from St John's have just received their gold stars and are united in saying how good the training was, full of practical advice and helping the course participants to see the world through the eyes of somebody with dementia. THE UNCONTROLLING LOVE OF GOD - Join us at Highgate House Conference Centre,

Northamptonshire, to discuss ideas that will change the way you think about the divine. Based around a series of set piece dialogues, this conference will open up avenues of theological thought that challenge the mainstream consensus that 'God' is all powerful and fundamentally 'in

OUR FUTURE HEALTH -Like Pauline and myself, you may have already registered for this large scale NHS research to gather data for detecting and preventing diseases earlier, such as dementia, cancer, diabetes and heart disease. It involves completing an online questionnaire, giving a blood sample and having blood pressure checked. As data is gradually assessed you will have the option of learning your future risks and analysis of your DNA. Almost two million have signed up but millions more, any age over 18, are sought. A SUMMARY OF GENERAL SYNOD:

The Church of England's General Synod convened from February 10 to 14, 2025, in London, focusing on safeguarding reforms and the clergy conduct measure.

Safeguarding

In response to past failures in handling abuse allegations, the Synod deliberated on enhancing the independence of its safeguarding processes. Two models were proposed:

Model 3: This approach involves establishing an external scrutiny body, likely on a statutory basis, to oversee safeguarding functions. Most responsibilities currently managed by the National Safeguarding Team (NST), excluding policy development, would be transferred to an external employer. Diocesan and cathedral safeguarding officers would remain under their existing structures, with further work to determine the legal and practical requirements necessary to implement

Model 4: This model advocates for a more comprehensive transfer, moving all safeguarding officers, including those in dioceses and cathedrals, to the same external body as the NST. This would centralize safeguarding under an independent entity, aiming for uniformity and reduced conflicts of interest.

The Synod endorsed what is being referred to as Model 3.5, emphasizing immediate progress by setting up an independent scrutiny body and conducting further analysis on the feasibility of Model 4. This decision was met with mixed reactions. Bishop Philip North, who put forward the amendment, in affect making this hybrid model 3.5, stated that it allows for immediate advancements while not hindering the pace of more fundamental changes. Conversely, many survivors and advocates expressed anger and disappointment, viewing the move as insufficient for restoring trust and addressing the church's safeguarding shortcomings. Bishop Joanne Grenfell (lead bishop for Safeguarding) expressed her disappointment that complete independence had not been agreed (more here) but this decision does not rule out option 4, once further work has been done.

Clergy Conduct Measure

The Synod granted final approval to a new Clergy Conduct Measure, aiming to establish clearer expectations and accountability for clergy behaviour. This measure seeks to provide a more transparent framework for addressing misconduct, ensuring that clergy are held to consistent standards across the Church. The specifics of the measure include defined procedures for reporting and investigating allegations, as well as outlined consequences for confirmed misconduct. This development is part of the Church's broader effort to enhance integrity and trust within its leadership.

Living in Love and Faith (LLF)

The LLF initiative, which explores questions of identity, sexuality, relationships, and marriage, was due to be a significant topic at this Synod. The House of Bishops had been expected to present detailed proposals, but instead notified Synod of delays to this. Some of this will now be discussed at the July Synod and some aspects have been pushed to 2026.

Other Matters

The Synod also discussed and committed to work to increase the numbers of vocations from coming from working class backgrounds. They voted to increase the representation of young adults on Synod. And as I write this on Thursday afternoon they are discussing restructuring the central organisation of the church.

Leadership and Governance Challenges

The Synod occurred amidst significant leadership transitions and internal tensions. Following the resignation of Archbishop Justin Welby over a safeguarding scandal, Archbishop Stephen Cottrell, serving as the interim head, faced calls for his resignation due to his handling of abuse allegations. A notable portion (20%) of Synod members attempted to prevent Archbishop Cottrell from addressing the assembly.

Consultation for the next Archbishop of Canterbury
