
God says: I will judge with fairness. Let us not judge others with our pre-formed ideas.




Jesus says: Peace is what I leave you. Let us accept the peace that Jesus offers, and work to enable it to spread.








The Collect

As we prepare to explore God's word, let us pray together:



Let us give thanks to our gracious God. It is right to give thanks and praise.




Ever- beckoning God we thank you that in every age you are calling people to venture forth in faith – leaving behind the securities of self-interest in pursuit of justice, truth and peace.

And so we praise you with the faithful of every time and place who have struggled to embody your word and live out your wisdom, singing:


We sing
